QUALITY PUBLIC SERVICES MATTER

Quality public services are the building blocks for strong and healthy communities.

Winnipeg's water and wastewater treatment is currently operated as a high quality public service. Everyday, CUPE members in the Water and Waste Department provide attention to the quality and accessibility of our public water. They make sure the water from our tap is pure and safe.

CITY PROPOSES MUNICIPAL CORPORATE UTILITY

In November 2008, Winnipeg City Council voted to explore setting up a Municipal Corporate Utility (cityowned but at arms length) to operate city utilities. They also approved using a business (public-private partnership or P3) method to "design, construct, finance and operate" water and waste control centres.

The union representing city workers and community groups see risks in these actions. These decisions could lead to privatizing the City's wastewater services. If private companies operate public services, they tend to be less accountable to public needs.

HOW COUNCIL VOTED

The Councillors who voted with the Mayor in favour of the motion were: Grant Nordman, Scott Fielding, Gord Steeves, Justin Swandel, Jeff Browaty, Russ Wyatt, Mike Pagtakhan, Harry Lazarenko and Mike O'Shaughnessy.

City Councillors who voted against the motion were: Jenny Gerbasi, Dan Vandal, Harvey Smith, and Lillian Thomas.

PRIVATIZATION IS NOT THE ANSWER

Privatization of our water and wastewater in any form is not the answer. Evidence from across Canada and other countries has shown that once water and wastewater privatization takes hold, public accountability and openness are lost. Water rates increase when corporate rights take over from community rights and international trade agreements favour corporations.

Water and wastewater services and infrastructure must be publicly financed and delivered. Companies can design and construct infrastructure, but we are good at the rest.
