Greetings:

Listed below please find a review of some of the key issues our Local has dealt with since our last Central Council meeting.

1. P3 – Disraeli Bridge:

The City of Winnipeg is looking to enter into a public-private partnership arrangement with repair work for the Disraeli Bridge. City Council approved the deal on May 14th, 2008 which ultimately means that if the City goes ahead with the plan, it would cost the citizens of Winnipeg more money in the end.

P3's are more costly, less efficient, non transparent and they 0 prevent public control of vital public assets. When P3's go wrong, it is inevitably the taxpayer who has to bail the project out.

The repair job will begin in 2009 and will take about three years to complete. It is expected to be one of the most expensive construction projects in the city outside of the upgrades to the water and sewer system.

The vote at City Council was 11 to 4 in favor of proceeding with the P3 process. (Councillors Thomas, Vandal, Gerbasi and Smith against).

At the June 16th meeting there will be elections for a coordinating committee and adoption of by-laws.

In light of the EOC report and the attack on public services and our jobs, Winnipeggers need to stand together and push back against privatization.

I urge you as members to support this coalition.

5. Michael Pacheco and Family & Riley Scromeda Trust Fund:

A fundraiser BBQ was held on Tuesday, May 13th for Michael and his family and for the Riley Scromeda Trust Fund at 1155 Pacific Avenue. I want to take this opportunity to thank all of the people who participated and those who organized this successful event.

A special thank you to Dave Gaudreau, who helped plan an event in memory of Shannon which was held on Friday, May 23rd, 2008 at "Alive" in the Exchange District. This event along with donations from various labour and other organizations, helped to raise almost \$19,000.

Once again, thanks to all of our members for their support of these two families.

6. CUPE Local 500 Steward Orientation:

This past month the Local held two Steward Orientations. These sessions are the first step in learning the role of a shop steward. Our Shop Stewards are the eyes and ears for our Union and Local.
