RE: Current Issues Update

Greetings:

Listed below please find a review of some of the key issues our Local has dealt with since our last Central Council meeting.

Bargaining Updates:

City of Winnipeg and Local 500:

On February 14th, 2008, members voted 85% in favour of the tentative agreement between the City of Winnipeg and CUPE Local 500. In total, 1,320 members voted on the new agreement.

The new deal provides for a wage increase of 7.2 per cent over the three years. It also includes a no lay-off provision for permanent staff during the life of the agreement. Other highlights include improvements to dental and vision as well as increases to shift premium, safety footwear and tool allowance.

The agreement also renews a Joint Education, Training and Staff Development Fund for \$1.5 million.

I would like to thank the members of the negotiating committee, staff and other members who contributed to the success of this tough round of bargaining.

I would also like to thank you, the members, for your patience and support while we worked on your behalf to reach an agreement.

Civic Unions:

The leaders of the Civic Unions and Associations' continue to meet on a regular basis to discuss matters of mutual concern. These meetings are an important way for us to discuss and strategize our response to various civic policies/practices and political decisions.

Mayor's Annual State of the City Address:

The Mayor's Annual State of the City Address was held on Friday, February 8, 2008 at the Winnipeg Convention Centre.

His speech focused mainly on infrastructure priorities, the Red Tape Commission, 311 contact centre and Aboriginal Youth Strategy. He spent the majority of time talking about improvements to public safety and reducing crime in the city.

The Mayor also talked about how this spring EPC and Council will explore how to change their approach to the water utility so it becomes a "real" utility, free to seek out customers, free from day-to-day financial or political interference, and with a clear, transparent financial relationship that can stand up to scrutiny from the Public Utility Board.

Councillor Dan Vandal raised this issue very effectively last year and we believe this is a positive commitment by the Mayor to make the utility more transparent.

Assembly of First Nations Grand Chief Phil Fontaine and Manitoba's Grand Chief Ron Evans spoke at a gathering here in Winnipeg on January 31st, 2008.

They highlighted the fact that many aboriginal people across our country are living in poverty and are in need of decent homes, clean and safe drinking water and better schools.

Working together and building partnerships is the key to making positive changes in communities across Canada. Sadly, many people in our province are unaware of the conditions in Northern communities. Solutions to poor housing and over crowed schools remain a top priority.
